

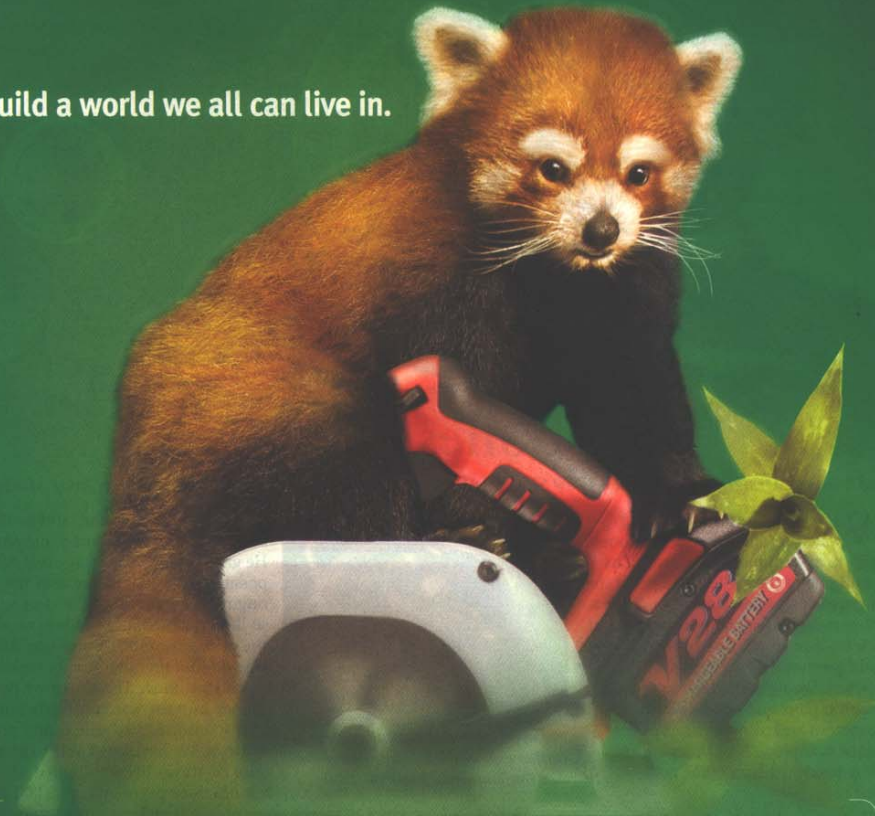
WORKING TO BE ENVIRONMENTALLY FRIENDLY...
